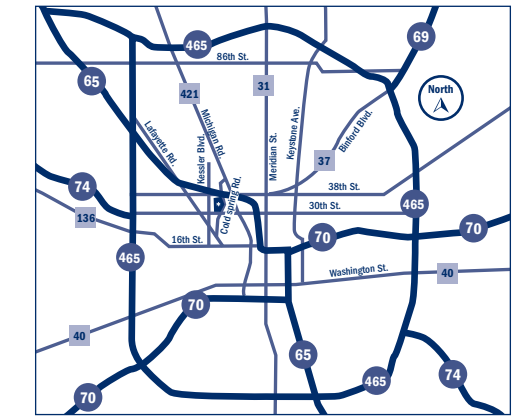

Upon admission, and after receipt of a letter from the registrar:

2. Plan schedule with an academic advisor.
3. Register for classes in the Office of the Registrar.
4. Make payment arrangements by the first day of the summer session.

**Withdrawal**

A student who is unable to continue in a class and wishes to withdraw must process a withdrawal form in the Office of the Registrar. A student who discontinues without notice will receive a failing grade in the course and will be financially responsible for the full cost of the semester. Tuition refund is based on official date of withdrawal.
