

Regina Emberton



Regina Emberton is the CEO of ChoiceLight, Inc., a publicprivate partnership providing access to broadband infrastructure through a dark fiber optic network serving commercial, financial, educational, healthcare, and governmental agencies in

Elkhart, Marshall, and St. Joseph counties. ChoiceLight is a vital asset in the South Bend-Elkhart region, enabling companies to adopt new technologies and compete in the 21st century.

Prior to this role, Emberton served as CEO of the South Bend - Elkhart Regional Partnership, catalyzing a culture of inclusive regional collaboration resulting in a thoughtful strategic plan and unprecedented investment to the region. Before that, Regina was engaged in a variety of commercial real estate projects, including consulting, brokerage, investment, and development.

Emberton received her BS and MPA in Community and Economic Development from Indiana University South Bend. A lifelong learner, she also graduated from the Leadership South Bend/Mishawaka program, earning the CCIM (Certified Commercial Investment Member) and SIOR (Society of Office and Industrial Realtors) designations while working in the commercial real estate industry, and the CEcD (Certified Economic Developer) certification while working in regional economic development.

Emberton was recently recognized in the Inaugural Indiana 250 awardee class by the Indiana Business Journal and was previously awarded the Inaugural Outstanding Young Business Leader by the South Bend Regional Chamber. Her civic involvement includes serving as a board member for the Community Foundation of St. Joseph County and the Medical Education Foundation, as a Dean's Advisory Board Member for the IU South Bend Judd Leighton School of Business and Economics, and as a member of the Marian University Ancilla College Board of Visitors.

Regina and her husband Brad have two daughters.

Jackie Walorski - posthumous

Jackie Walorski was born and raised in South Bend and graduated from Riley High School. She attended Liberty University and ultimately graduated from Taylor University with a Bachelor of Arts in Communications and Public Administration. Jackie

started her professional life as a stringer photographer for the South Bend Tribune, and later became an on-air reporter for WSBT-TV. She went on to be the Director of the St. Joseph County Humane Society and the Director of Development for Ancilla College. She also worked for the South Bend Area Chamber of Commerce and was the Director of Institutional Advancement at Indiana University South Bend.

Jackie and her husband Dean Swihart, both licensed and ordained ministers, were full-time non-traditional missionaries in Romania where they assisted in church planting, worked with homeless children, orphanages, the children's burn unit, and remote villages. They were living in Romania during the tragic events of September 11, 2001. Two years later they returned home to South Bend as her father's health had declined.

Walorski first ran for Indiana State Representative of District 21 in 2004 and won, serving in that position until 2010. In 2012, she was elected as the Congresswoman for Indiana's 2nd District, holding that position until her passing. Jackie split her time between Washington D.C. and District 2, always eager to meet constituents, business owners and veterans.

Jackie's passion for her district and the United States of America was evident to all who met her, and her energy and determination will be greatly missed. Jackie always viewed her position in the Congress as an opportunity to serve God's people through Christ's love.
