Another highlight of the year was the College Athletes Day of Prayer in which we collaborated with student-athletes from Butler and IUPUI for fellowship and prayer.

Then we did a March Madness themed event for the NCAA tournament sweet 16. We are wrapping up the year with our big End of the Year Celebration on April 26th at the Fountain. All 4 of the events so far were well attended beyond our expectations, and we expect a big turnout at the End of the Year Celebration too.
