### REGISTRATION INFORMATION

#### ► ACADEMIC ADVISING AND REGISTERING FOR CLASSES

- CHANGES IN ACADEMIC PROGRAM AND/OR ADVISOR:** If wishing to change advisors and/or declare or change a major, minor, or concentration, complete and submit the Change of Major/Advisor form available in the Office of the Registrar. Check your CAMS student portal as directed in your registration e-mail to see who is currently listed as your advisor in CAMS; submit a Change of Major/Advisor form well in advance of registration if the advisor listed is not correct. If the advisor listed in CAMS is not your correct advisor, you will be unable to register.
- COURSE SELECTION & APPROVAL:** Review course selections and complete a schedule planning form with your advisor.
  - Self-tracking guides for graduation requirements are available at the Office of the Registrar to help in schedule planning.
  - If you are registering for a course for which you do not have the required prerequisite, a course that requires instructor permission to register, or courses with conflicting class meeting times, you must obtain signatures from the applicable instructor(s) in the shaded section of your schedule planning form and bring the form to the Office of the Registrar after you have registered online so these courses can be added.
  - If registering for an independent study or tutorial, obtain a request for private study form from the Office of the Registrar (MH 104). These courses require the approval of Bill Harting, Assistant Provost.
- REGISTRATION:** Registration for continuing students will take place online. **All students receive information about determining their appointed registration day by e-mail at their Marian University e-mail address;** registration days are assigned based on class level as determined by the number of earned credit hours. Registration will take place October 30-November 10. **To register online, follow the directions in the “[Step-by-Step Guide to Online Registration](#)” in the [Registration Resources](#) section of the Office of the Registrar’s website.**
  - Newly admitted and readmitted students will receive information regarding when and how they can register.
  - NO LATE REGISTRATION:** Students **must** register **by Sunday, Jan. 7<sup>th</sup> @ 11:59pm** or they will **not** be able to start classes for the spring semester. The CAMS Student Portal will be available for online registration through 11:59pm on January 7<sup>th</sup>.
  - SCHEDULES & TEXTBOOKS:** Following registration, print a copy of your schedule from your CAMS student portal. You must have a schedule in order to charge textbooks to your Marian University student account. Required textbooks can be viewed online at [www.marian.edu](http://www.marian.edu) → Current Students → My Marian → Bookstore.  
*You must comply with the published tuition payment policy and meet all tuition payment deadlines in order to confirm your registration. Students who do not comply with the published tuition payment policy will incur late fees on their student accounts.*

#### ► WAITING LIST

- If placed on a waiting list, you are not considered to be registered for that course unless an opening becomes available.
- Nursing students are not permitted to place themselves on waiting lists for clinicals.
- Check your schedule via your CAMS student portal to see whether you have been taken off the waiting list and added into the class. Other notification of waiting list status will not be provided.
- At 4 p.m. on Friday, January 5<sup>th</sup>, all waiting lists will be finalized and students will no longer have the ability to add themselves to a waiting list or to be moved from the waiting list into the class. It will no longer be possible to get into a course from the waiting list without following the schedule change procedure as described below. If you are not comfortable taking the risk that you may not get into a closed class at the last minute, select an alternate course to complete your schedule.

#### ► SCHEDULE CHANGES

- At any time before Sunday, January 7<sup>th</sup> at 11:59 p.m., you may drop or add classes online through your CAMS student portal. On or after the first day of the semester, you must submit any changes to your schedule, including section changes, in person at the Office of the Registrar using a Schedule Change (Drop/Add) form. Instructor and advisor signatures are required beginning January 9<sup>th</sup>. You are responsible for adhering to the following deadlines to add and/or drop courses.

**LAST DAY TO WITHDRAW FROM A SINGLE CLASS (for semester-long courses).....MARCH 23**  
**LAST DAY TO WITHDRAW FROM ALL CLASSES FOR THE SEMESTER (WITHDRAW FROM THE UNIVERSITY).....APRIL 27**

- A \$50.00 fee will be charged for each Schedule Change (Drop/Add) form submitted on or after January 15<sup>th</sup>.
- If you discontinue a class without following the above procedure to drop the class, you will receive a failing grade.**

**PLEASE NOTE:** Students are expected to pay all student account charges by the due dates published by Marian University. The student will be responsible for paying any and all costs associated with collection efforts by Marian University. This may include interest, collection costs, attorney fees and court fees.

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## SCHEDULES FOR WITHDRAWAL FROM THE UNIVERSITY and REDUCTION OF CHARGES:

A student who withdraws from school may be entitled to full or partial reduction of charges. Reduction of charges is based on the official date of withdrawal as recorded in the Office of the Registrar. Consult with the Financial Aid Office concerning the impact that withdrawal may have upon current financial aid awards.

### Standard (semester-long) courses

- withdraw during calendar week 1 = 100%
- withdraw during calendar week 2 = 90%
- withdraw during calendar week 3 = 60%
- withdraw during calendar week 4 = 25%
- withdraw during calendar week 5 or after = 0%

### Courses lasting 5 weeks or more

(up to, but not including, semester-long courses)

- withdraw during calendar week 1 = 100%
- withdraw during calendar week 2 = 50%
- withdraw during calendar week 3 or after = 0%
- *last date to withdraw with "W" grade – 5 business days before the end date of class*

### Courses lasting 4 or fewer weeks – no "W" grades given without complete withdrawal from the university

- withdraw prior to start of class = 100%; withdraw after class begins = 0% – *last date to withdraw with "W" grade – 5 business days before published end date of the class. If class meets less than 5 days, withdraw is not permitted after class begins.*

## FILE FOR GRADUATION

- 2017-2018 Associate and Bachelor degree candidates must file a Graduation Application with the Office of the Registrar no later than December 1, 2017. ## **CLASS CANCELLATION OR CHANGE**

- The university reserves the right to change or cancel courses as needs and enrollment warrant. Because course information may change in between registration and the first day of classes, students should print an updated schedule from their CAMS student portal immediately prior to the start of the classes.

## **COURSE LOAD**

- The normal load for a full-time student is 12-18 credit hours per semester.
- Because academic performance may suffer when an overload is taken, students with a cumulative GPA of 2.0 or above wishing to enroll in 19 or more credits and students with a cumulative GPA below 2.0 wishing to enroll in 17 or more credits must receive signature approval from the Office of Academic Affairs, MH 110.
- An additional per credit hour fee is charged if enrolled in more than 19 credits per semester.
- Full-time students earning fewer than 16 credits each semester will be unable to complete degree requirements in the prescribed four years for a bachelor degree or two years for an associate degree, unless additional credits are earned during summer school or by examination.

## **ATTENDANCE AND CROSS-REGISTRATION**

- See information and policies as printed in the [Undergraduate Course Catalog](#). Information for those interested in the cross-registration program (the Consortium for Urban Education – CUE) is available by request in the Office of the Registrar. All cross-registration forms for spring 2018 classes must be submitted to the Office of the Registrar by December 1, 2018.

## **CONVOCATIONS**

- Convocations are a required component of each department's senior seminar course. All Marian University students are encouraged and welcome to attend the convocations.

## **PASS/FAIL AND AUDIT OPTIONS**

- **PASS/FAIL OPTION** - This option is available to juniors and seniors in elective courses (not applicable to courses required for the major or minor discipline, certification, or general education). Using the Schedule Change (Drop/Add) Form, all changes to or from pass/fail status must be submitted to the Office of the Registrar by February 9.
- **AUDIT GRADING OPTION** – Students wishing to audit a course must be admitted to the university. This option is not available for laboratory, studio, or practicum courses. No credit or grade is given. A fee of \$200.00 per credit hour is charged for an audited course. All changes to or from audit status must be recorded on a Schedule Change (Drop/Add) form and submitted to the Office of the Registrar by January 12.

## **COURSE LEVELS**

- Courses numbered below 100 level (ENG 099, COL 099, MAT 090, MAT 095) are graded developmental courses designed to bring students up to the college level in these subjects. A combined maximum of 12 credits in developmental, activity, and enhancement courses may apply toward a bachelor degree or 6 credits toward an associate degree.
- Numbers 100-299 are lower division courses designed primarily for students at the freshman and sophomore levels.
- Numbers 300-498 are upper division courses primarily for juniors and seniors but are open to students who have completed the freshman level of study.
- Number 499 designates independent study or a research project at an advanced level.
- Numbers 500+ are graduate level courses.
- Of the 128 credits for a bachelor degree, at least 64 credits must be at the 200 level or above.

## **FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT OF 1974 (FERPA)**

Marian University operates in compliance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA), as amended. Students have the right to inspect all official records which pertain to them and to challenge inaccurate or misleading information, except parents' financial records and confidential letters and statements placed in the record before January 1, 1975, or placed under conditions where students have signed a waiver of right of access.

All student academic information is considered confidential except the following "directory" information available to the public: student's name, campus address, off-campus address, email address, telephone number, date of birth, photograph, major field of study, participation in university activities and sports, physical and performance statistics of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, enrollment status, degrees, awards, and honors including the Dean's List, and most recent previous institution attended by student.

**The student may request that "directory" information not be released by completing the FERPA Request form in the Office of the Registrar at the beginning of each semester. Failure to notify the Office of the Registrar may mean that university publications, such as team rosters or student directories, may include some directory information. ## **ARMY RESERVE OFFICER TRAINING (ROTC)**

Through a cooperative program with IUPUI, Marian University students may enroll in the Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) program which leads to a commission in the U.S. Army, Army National Guard or Army Reserve. All ROTC classes (indicated with course prefix MIL) taken are applied as general electives to your Marian University academic record. The leadership classes are open to full-time students, men and women, without incurring any obligation to continue the program to enter into military service. The first two years are exploratory in nature and offer one or two hours of academic credit per semester. Students wanting to continue the program and receive a commission upon graduation must apply for admission into the advanced program at the end of the second year of ROTC. Selection is competitive. Marian University students who are eligible for assistance can receive significant scholarship assistance by participation in this program. There are no restrictions on majors for students interested in ROTC. Students who do not continue may still use credits as electives earned toward any degree. ## **SPECIAL TOPICS COURSES – Spring 2018**

### **ACC 480 A Special Topics: Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Service (3)**

This volunteer program prepares students to process both federal and state income tax returns for eligible citizens. Students will complete an IRS-developed VITA training program for two levels of service – Basic and Advanced. This level of training will permit the volunteer to prepare most individual tax returns. Student volunteers will be required to successfully pass the IRS VITA Certification Tests for two levels of tax preparation service. Once certified, student volunteers will conduct interviews with VITA clients, prepare both the federal and state tax returns using IRS eFile software, and undergo a Quality Review Process to ensure accurate and acceptable tax returns for electronic filing in addition to providing tax information and tax law to VITA clients.

### **COM 380 A Special Topics: Global Food Narratives / GLS 380 A Global Issues Seminar (3)**

How far does that tomato travel before it reaches your salad? Why will Americans never find Jamaican bananas in their local grocery store? What does it mean to eat locally in a world that is increasingly globally connected? These are just some of the questions that we will work to answer this semester in *Global/Local Food Narratives*. In order to explore these questions and more, we will read works of nonfiction, such as *Coming Home to Eat: The Pleasures and Politics of Local Food* by Gary Paul Nabhan, delve into scholarly explorations of globalization and neoliberalism through texts like *Planet of Slums* by Mike Davis, and find out how we can understand food with rhetorical theory.

### **HIS 380 A Special Topics: Civil War (3)**

This course examines the causes and consequences of the American Civil War and Reconstruction, beginning with the outbreak of the Mexican War in 1846 and ending at the conclusion of Reconstruction in 1877. Through lectures, discussions, documentaries, and other class activities, students will analyze how the war and Reconstruction affected the nation from a racial, class, gendered, political, legal, economic, international, and cultural perspective. Students will also consider such questions as what precipitated the Civil War, how did the conflict influence the lives of people in both the United States and Confederate States, what explains Union victory and Confederate defeat, how and why was slavery abolished, and what accounts for the political and social upheavals and reforms that occurred during Reconstruction?

### **HIS 380 B / SOC 380 B Special Topics: Criminology-Family Violence (3)**

Employing a definition of “family” that is broad enough to include dating violence and abuse of elderly and disabled family members along with child maltreatment and intimate partner abuse, this course provides students with an introduction to the social problem of family violence, and the various institutional responses to that problem, in the United States over the past three centuries. The class also traces how conceptions and meanings of the home, the family, and the rights of individual family members have changed over time.

**POL 380 A / SOC 380 A Special Topics: Public Policy Making (3)**

This course will examine public policy-making in the United States and provide students with the opportunity to see what is meant by public policy, and understand how policy is made and put into practice. Additionally, the course will equip students with the tools to evaluate public policy in place. Specific issues will be incorporated throughout the class to understand and put these skills into practice. Topics to be covered will include health care, education, social security/welfare, the environment/energy, and homeland security. Students will learn not only about current policies in place, but also why some pressing issues and policy solutions are placed on the political agenda while others are not. This course is open to students in all majors and there are no prerequisites

**SPA 280 A Special Topics: Foreign Language Teaching Methods (3)**

The goal of this course is to introduce future teachers to current pedagogical theory and best practices associated with foreign language teaching and learning. The course will focus on two two main areas: theory of language learning and classroom practices and strategies. Over the course of the semester, students will read and discuss current theories of language teaching and learning, be exposed to and analyze effective foreign language teaching, reflect on their own foreign language education, and create a dynamic and reflective teaching portfolio complete with lesson plans for future use. Provided that all students intend to become Spanish teachers, the class will be carried out in Spanish, including course discussions and written assignments.
