


growth, both as a scholar and as a leader. We look forward to seeing you thrive both in and outside of the classroom at Marian.



Best Buddies

Through the Business Office, you can manage your balance, set up a payment plan, and find help with all questions regarding paying for Marian University, adding a Person Proxy, and completing KnightQuest.

Student account balances can be managed and paid through MUHUB under the Student Finance tab or with cash or check in-person at the Business Office. In MUHUB, you can also set up a payment plan each semester and receive any refunded amounts within the Payment and Refund Options tab.

Students may grant 'person proxy' access to an individual to access certain aspects of their student MUHUB account. Common person proxies may include a parent or guardian, a spouse, or a family member.



Proxy access can permit designated individuals to view billing information, view financial aid information, and/or view student grade information. A student chooses which information to grant proxy access. This can all be set up within User Options under View/Add Proxy Access in MUHUB.

Campus Safety

The Marian University Police Department provides 24-hour-a-day patrol protection to the campus, including parking lots and residence halls. Marian University police officers are vested with full law enforcement powers and responsibilities. All officers that are employed by Marian University are required to be certified graduates of the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy.

The Marian University Police Department is responsible for a full range of public safety services, including all crime reports, investigations, medical emergencies, fire emergencies, traffic accidents, enforcement of laws regulating underage drinking, the use of controlled substances, weapons, and all other incidents requiring police assistance.

Marian University highly encourages all students to download the CampusShield app on their smartphones and other devices. This allows the Marian University Police Department to quickly communicate emergency alerts with students and enables students to share their location with police when in need of emergency assistance.

Parking passes can be picked up from Campus Safety at the start of the school year. The cost for a parking pass is \$320 for residential students and \$220 for commuters, which is billed directly to the student's account after getting a parking pass.

CANVAS marian.edu/canvas

CANVAS is the learning management system in use at Marian University. Students will use this online platform to review course content and complete assignments. Marian University follows FERPA guidelines regarding the privacy, release, and access of students' education record.

It is a destination in which the library becomes an extension of the classroom, cultivating interdisciplinary thinking, learning, and resource-sharing in a safe, collegiate atmosphere.

Library users are welcome to browse our various collections and claim their preferred study space for quiet reading on the third floor, and share their notes and thinking via our dry erase boards in our second-floor collaborative study space. Above all, be sure to ask questions of library staff to ensure you have the resources needed to enhance your study and academic growth.

The EcoLab property is a 55-acre natural area on the Marian University campus where environmental restoration began 100 years ago with esteemed landscape architect, Jens Jensen and continues today with Marian students, K-12 school groups, and the general public.

Marian University students and faculty use the EcoLab in their classes as a site for hands-on experiences in the natural environment. It also provides a great location for undergraduate research and for internships in ecological restoration and environmental education.

- Enlarged text
- Housing
- Sign language interpreting
- Captioned material

Housed within the Personalized Learning Center, the Spectrum of Knights Autism Program is a fee-based program that provides individualized support and guidance to students on the autism spectrum. The program allows students to work one-on-one with Marian University's autism coordinator, who will guide and coach students from their first year on campus through graduation.



Health management for Marian University students includes assessment, treatment, and education. Students with health insurance are expected to present their card upon arrival. All students will receive services regardless of insurance.

Each visit requires a \$10 co-pay, even if your insurance co-pay is greater than that amount. Our goal is to make the health center a place where students can get the answers and support needed to feel better and resume full engagement in coursework and campus life.

Health and wellness education is also emphasized, as this is an important element toward optimal wellness. The Student Health Center outreach programs include Wellness Wednesdays on CONNECT, pop-up tables bimonthly in the Dining Commons, Student Health Fairs each fall semester and spring semester, and Love on a Leash the first Wednesday of the month.

When a student is seen in the health center or by their healthcare provider and unable to attend class, documentation is shared with the dean of students. A message documenting this will be sent to the faculty of that student. This does not excuse the student from completing assignments or future classes, however, faculty are asked to accommodate the student as appropriate relative to the missed class and time to complete missed work.
